Freshman Orientation Details

Freshman Orientation is slated for Friday, August 12th from 9:00 to 12:00 noon. On that morning, the students will get a tour of the high school, spend some time with the principals and counselors, some time with their homeroom or "Tanager Time" teachers and will be able to check out their student laptop device if they bring their laptop fee. The students should plan to be on hand for the entire 3-hour period. Students missing all or part of orientation will be required to sit through a make-up orientation session prior to attending classes the first time.

There is a \$25.00 use fee for the school district provided laptop. A check can be made out to VHS or cash payment is also acceptable. If your student has an unpaid balance from the previous school year, that balance will need to be settled prior to the student receiving their laptop or arrangements need to be made to bring the account current. Notifications of existing balances will be sent out prior to orientation.

Lunch money can also be deposited into student lunch accounts at the conclusion of orientation activities. Please include this amount separate from the student laptop amount as they will be entered into different accounts.

Sophomore, Junior & Senior Orientation Details

- Sophomore Orientation will be from 10:30-11:30 am on August 17th.
- Junior Orientation will be from 1:00-2:00 pm on August 17th.
- Senior Orientation will be from 2:30-3:30 pm on August 17th.

All sophomores, juniors and seniors should plan to attend and bring with them a \$25.00 check or cash for Student Device Use, to receive their laptop. Seniors should also bring with them a second check or cash amount for \$20.00 for senior class fees. Both checks can be made out to Vermillion High School.

If your student has an unpaid balance from the previous school year, that balance will need to be settled prior to the student receiving their laptop or arrangements need to be made to bring the account current. Notifications of existing balances will be sent out prior to orientation.

Lunch money can also be deposited into student lunch accounts at the conclusion of orientation activities. Please include this amount separate from the student laptop check/cash or senior class fees as they will each be entered into different accounts.



Student Cell Phones & Private Spaces

The new school year brings a new class of students into the building while three classes continue on toward the end goal of graduation. As students work through the transition to adulthood, one thing that has been an area of concern in recent years is the cell phone and the teen user.

This year, we are asking teachers building-wide to enforce the expectation that when a student leaves the classroom to use the restroom, that the phone remains in the classroom. We are doing this for a couple of reasons:

- 1) we fully believe it will reduce the amount of time a student is away from the classroom because they will be without the distraction of the phone,
- 2) the restroom/locker room are locations in which there should always be an expectation of privacy and therefore, there should be no phones in the hands of restroom users. Remember, that cell phones are all equipped with cameras, and lastly,
- 3) it eliminates the excuse of requesting a restroom break when in reality the student is just looking to spend time on the phone.

All of this, combined with last year's TikTok challenges and subsequent restroom damage that occurred as a result, have necessitated these limits.

We anticipate that this new expectation will be met with some resistance which is why in

the interest of complete transparency, we are sharing with you what will occur when students object and insist upon carrying their phone out the classroom door with them.

In such an instance, the teacher will be expected to refer the student to Mr. Huska or Mr. Frey for failure to follow a reasonable directive (insubordination). The student will then meet with Mr. Huska or Mr. Frey and they





will explain the expectation again in an attempt to discover why the student feels they cannot comply. Finally, if it becomes clear that the student has mistaken their *privilege* to carry a cell phone at Vermillion High School as an exclusive *right*, the offending student will lose the *privilege* of cell phone possession during the school day in what we expect will be a partnership between administration and the student's parents for a predetermined period of time.

Finally, it is important to understand that we want students to have access to their phones during the school day. Cell phones, when utilized appropriately, can be a powerful educational and communication tool right along with a laptop or other classroom technology. Learning the responsible and appropriate use of the device is a *critical* step toward becoming a responsible adult. This new expectation will come very easy for well over 90% of the students at VHS. We typically only encounter a few who may misunderstand how far the privilege actually extends. We hope to clarify this upfront, in the hope of creating a more respectful and accepting school environment for all.

Bus Service Need?

The Vermillion School District provides optional bus service for public and private school students in grades kindergarten through twelfth grade. This optional bus service will be provided for students who reside within a five-mile radius of a student's principal school which includes in-town service. The fee for this service will be \$75 per child, per semester. A family with more than two children being transported will not be charged more than \$150 per semester. If the bus pass fee is paid by an established due date, the early payment amount will be \$50 per child per



semester with a maximum per family expense of \$100, per semester.

Parents interested in the optional bus service need to complete a registration form and pay the fee prior to utilizing the service. A bus pass will be issued upon completion of the registration form and payment of the fee. **Students who qualify for free lunches may receive a free bus pass upon completion of the registration form.** The bus pass must be available to show the driver each time the student boards the bus.



Registration for the optional bus service can be done at the Vermillion School District Administrative Offices located at 1001 E. Main Street beginning August 4th and continuing through August 17th, from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm and 1:00 pm to 4:30 pm. The fee for the first semester bus service is due before August 18, 2022. The fee for the second semester bus service is due before January 4, 2023.

Bus service for students who reside beyond the five-mile radius of their attended school will be provided at no charge. If there are any questions, please contact **Lynette Meyers** at the Bus Barn - 605-670-2942.

Minga - VHS's New ID, Hall Pass & Info Platform

At your student's orientation session, we will be introducing them to the Minga app. The students will receive an email message containing everything they need to download the app to their phone (if they choose to do so) and to set it up on their student devices.



The app and website will operate much the same way and will both feature daily content such as relevant building announcements and an events calendar. It will serve as a digital ID for your student when the student needs to leave the building during the day or access the building at times other than the typical morning arrival. The district office staff that supervises our East student entrance will require students to display their ID as they come and go from the building after the beginning of the school day. While it is not our goal to make access to VHS more difficult, it is our goal to do all that we can to ensure the students are safe. By utilizing a digital ID system, it will help ensure that students who require access to the building, gain access while those lacking proper identification do not gain easy access to the building. Unfortunately, this is a necessary step in the world in which we live today.

Lastly, we will utilize this same app and website as our new e-Hall Pass system. The same digital ID that your student displays when leaving for a USD class or an Unplanned Period Pass (UPP) will also display if the student has a pass to use the restroom, visit the nurse's office or even leave with his/her/their sports team for a game during the school day. We think students and staff will appreciate that all of these features will be available from one online application.



Student Handbook Updates & Changes

For the 2022-23 school year, <u>the VHS Student Handbook</u> underwent a few changes. Initially, the handbook was reorganized. This was done simply to improve the usability of the handbook and make topics easier to find.

Two areas in which the handbook received wording and policy changes are Dress Code and Responsible Attendance and Academics Policy (RAAP).

Dress Code changes:

I will be the first to admit that the dress code is an area that is challenging to enforce and because of that, often it becomes easier to simply not deal with the headaches it brings about. However, some policy changes were necessary before we could move forward with any meaningful dress code enforcement.

During the past school year, Mr. Huska and I met frequently with a small group of students who were passionate about being involved in discussions relative to dress code. The dialog was beneficial for both sides and what was presented to the Board of Education last month was the result of these conversations. In short, the language of the dress code was adjusted to become more gender-neutral. Rather than having aspects of the policy which seem targeted at particular genders, this revamped policy is designed to be more general in its language. Some specific areas of emphasis remain:

- No hats or hoods are to be worn in the building during the school day. However, greater latitude for hair control items will be made by administration.
- Clothing worn on the upper torso is expected to meet the clothing on the lower half of the body this applies to all students.
- Visible undergarments continue to not be allowed.
- As before, clothing espousing alcohol or drug use, gang affiliation, vulgarities or intolerance and/or illegal activities will always be forbidden.

Clothing that fails to meet these standards is not to be worn during school hours while attending VHS. Students will be offered a clean clothing item if they are found to be in violation of dress code or will be permitted to call home for something to be brought to school. If the student decides to leave the school to change the offending clothing rather than accept the item offered by administration, the absence will be unexcused.



RAAP Changes:

The Responsible Attendance and Academics Program (RAAP) has been in place for a significant amount of time at Vermillion High School and was brought about during a school improvement process and study nearly 20 years ago (maybe longer). Those staff with the longevity to advise on the matter shared that the policy in its earlier iterations did have some positive benefit on overall student attendance. However, over the years, enforcement has become more and more difficult and our recent run through a global pandemic has created a difficult situation when you attempt to reward students for excellent attendance while also excusing illness absences with students who may, at times, miss weeks of school. The COVID19 pandemic greatly impacted schools and attendance has suffered, nationwide. VHS, like every other school in South Dakota – and really the United States – is now faced with the task of making attendance a high priority once again and holding firm on consequences for high absenteeism. As a staff and administration, we have come to realize that the RAAP policy has run its course. It was no longer effective in promoting strong attendance and for that reason, we have decided to end it.

While I recognize this change will not be popular with students, it was necessary. RAAP has simply become ineffective in improving attendance and when a policy proves ineffective, it needs to be changed or removed. Last year alone, much of the first and second semester, our attendance ran in the upper 80% range. While many urban schools would love to have attendance that good, it equates to 10-12 students absent per grade, per day or between 40-48 students building-wide. That number is simply too high for a high school and community the size of Vermillion. Our attendance should realistically be closer to 95% (20-25 students total), daily. We can and must, do better.

On page 11 of the <u>VHS Student Handbook</u>, found on the district website, the new policy is set forth. It is based in large part on a policy already utilized in a neighboring district and it aligns with the overall staff belief that students need to take final exams while also offering an avenue for seniors to opt-out of finals, *but only seniors*.

Should I take a Study Hall, UPP or Dual Credit or Another Class?

This year, study halls will be returning to the purview of the classroom teachers. It is our intention to do what we can to help make the study hall more beneficial for students by returning them to a smaller and quieter setting with a classroom teacher. As your student gains access to his/her/their schedule in the coming days, they should carefully consider if

they want a study hall and would indeed utilize that period for assignments and homework or if they feel taking another class would be a better use of his/her/their time.

Vermillion High School students have access to far greater elective offerings than students at comparable sized schools elsewhere in South Dakota. We would like to see registration numbers in those elective classes grow. Students can enhance their high school experiences by challenging themselves through exploring other areas of study!

An Unscheduled Period Pass (UPP) remains an option for students who qualify as well as a Dual Enrollment course at USD or another institution if that better fits your student's interests! It's always good to have options. Here at VHS, we're pleased to be able to offer a variety of options and opportunities.

Changes Still in the Works!

Unfortunately, not all changes planned for the summer were completed this summer. As such, we will deal with some construction within our building walls this fall. Additional student and faculty restrooms are in the works, but completion of these projects has been pushed back a bit into the school year.



The plan is for an existing restroom in the staff lounge to be expanded to two

restrooms and additional private restrooms to be added to an area near the original front doors off the main hallway. It is our hope that the additional stalls should take some of the pressure off the other restrooms in the building. Unfortunately, we will need to be patient a little while longer.

FAFSA

What are the deadlines for filling out the FAFSA form?

To be considered for federal student aid for the 2022–23 award year, you can complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form between Oct. 1, 2021, and 11:59 p.m. Central time (CT) on June 30, 2023.

Any FAFSA form corrections or updates must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. CT on Sept. 10, 2023. However, many states and colleges have earlier deadlines for applying for state and institutional financial aid, use Find your state's deadline. Check with your college or career school about its deadlines. Because of the variation in state and college deadlines, it's highly recommended that you fill out the FAFSA form as soon as you can after Oct. 1 to ensure that you don't miss out on available aid.¹
